Arlington Bluebell Walk

It has been a very strange year, in that due to Covid we had to introduce online booking for those who wanted to come on the Walk. We were unable to open the Farm Trails, so our visitors only had the choice of two one way round walks round Beatons Wood. The Bluebell Barn could not be open, meant our charities could not supply their delicious food or drink. We were able to relocate the Arlington Church Plant Stall into the well-ventilated Petting Animal Barn, where they beat previous record by raising over £9,000. The Action for Research second-hand book stall was not open, also those who relied on our mobility scooters were disappointed.

The positives are that the booking system supplied by our webmaster, then crucially adapted by Tim Church worked well, but halved the number of visitors we would have normally expected. It was vital for it to be user friendly for each Duty Charity, as they had to ensure we had a Track and Trace record of each adult visitor. Tim and I never imaged the volume of emails from those who had made bookings for a particular day and time, but for a variety of reasons had to change! I would like to thank Tim for generously giving up so much time to make these many changes and refunds, thus we crucially retained the goodwill of our visitors.

The weather was remarkable in that we experience the driest and coldest April for 60 years, meant we had the best and longest display of the white wood anemones known, followed by a late spectacular vistas of bluebells, which sadly meant the date we closed they still looked great.
